

NIH Director Dr. Francis Collins recently <u>announced</u> the selection of Joshua A. Gordon, M.D., Ph.D., as director of the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH). Dr. Gordon will come to NIH from Columbia University Medical Center, New York, and is expected to join NIH in September. He will be leading the institute with an annual budget of approximately \$1.5 billion.

The <u>Congressional Neuroscience Caucus</u>, the <u>American College of Neuropsychopharmacology</u>, and the American Brain Coalition sponsored a <u>briefing</u> on depression, featuring Helen Mayburg of Emory University.

## IN THE NEWS

- The House Appropriations Committee approved its Labor, Health and Human Services (LHHS) bill, funding NIH at \$33.3 billion, an increase of \$1.25 billion. Read more about the bill here.
- The Allen Institute for Brain Science has launched the <u>Allen Brain Observatory</u>: the first tool of its kind to provide a highly standardized survey of cellular-level activity in the mouse visual system.
- The NIH recently launched <u>Voices of the NIH Community</u>, a collection of 29 audio recordings in collaboration with StoryCorps, a national oral history project. <u>Here</u> are some ways you can use this collection and share stories.
- The National Institute on Aging (NIA) released its FY 2018 bypass budget for Alzheimer's and related dementias. The report, <u>Stopping Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias: Advancing Our Nation's Research Agenda</u>, estimates we will need an additional \$414 million in FY 2018 above our estimated base budget in FY 2017 to effectively treat and prevent Alzheimer's and related dementias by 2025.

- Two studies funded by the <u>Brain and Behavior Research Foundation</u> are in news one study <u>identified</u> specific brain network disturbances in bipolar disorder, whereas the second study <u>explored</u> risk of schizophrenia in men vs. women given their genomic profiles.
- Scientists from Columbia University are looking for participants for an essential tremor study which is the largest of its kind. Click here for details.
- In a <u>NIH-funded study</u>, scientists discovered 15 genome sites the first ever linked to depression in people of European ancestry. In another <u>study</u>, NIH-led researchers developed software that could facilitate drug development.
- August 8<sup>th</sup> marked the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the of the signing of the <u>Traumatic Brain Injury Act of 1996</u>. This Act was momentous in that it authorized funding for prevention, surveillance, research and State grant programs to improve service delivery and access for individuals with traumatic brain injury.
